Abstract

Misophonia (from the Greek misos - 'hate', phonia - 'sound') is characterised by a high degree of emotional reactivity as a result of intolerance to certain acoustic stimuli (Brout et al 2018). Specific patterns of sounds and/or sounds in specific situations or settings may be perceived as aversive, while other sounds, even significantly louder sounds, are tolerated (Jastreboff & Jastreboff, 2014). Dozier & Morrison (2017) include reactions due to visual triggers (e.g. leg swinging of another person). No clear physical property of the stimulus is found to explain the response (Jastreboff & Jastreboff, 2014). Instead, the meaning, social context or interpretation of the trigger seems to influence the response to these sounds (Bruxner, 2015; Schröder et al , 2013).
